
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## Who forms the team of Centre Narovinu? We introduce a new employee of our office in Nairobi

### Visit of adoptive parents in Kenya

In 2005, the wife found out about the existence of the Centrum Narovinu association guite by chance, when she was interested in a report about the humanitarian activities of the Centrum Narovinu association in Kenya while reading a women's magazine. She was so interested in the report that, still full of emotions, she found the Center's website and selected a six-year-old girl from the list of children registered in the aid program. When Inose learned to write, we started receiving structured, handwritten letters regularly, three times a year, to which we responded only sporadically. In these letters, Inose regularly informed us about the dry and rainy seasons in Kenya, about her successes at school, she had all our children, grandchildren, and grandmother say hello, the letter was always accompanied by a current photograph of Inose and information from the school about the academic results achieved... We learned but also very sad news, when the father of the family died in 2015 after a long, difficult illness (Inose was 16 at the time), Inose's mother tragically died in 2018, and



that was not he end of her ordeal. In 2021 Inose's brother also died in a car accident, who after the death of his parents remained the sole breadwinner of the family... After the cascade of these unfortunate events, only three orphans remained from a relatively large family - Inose and her two brothers, the twins Joshua and

Moses. When we received another mandatory letter at the end of last year, with the usual information about the weather and study results, from which, however, this time it appeared that Inose will finish her high school studies in 2023 and become a certified Montessori teacher for children aged 3-6. We suddenly found out that maybe now is the right (and maybe the last dream) to travel and meet our adopted daughter in person, because finishing her studies and starting a job would probably end our relationship. And so we planned this year, a summer vacation in Kenya. On the very first evening after arriving in Nairobi, we met with the director of the Nairobi office of the NarovinuCenter, Ken Okongo. Ken accepted our invitation to dinner, so we could personally thank him for the Center's many years of exemplary care in providing living and study needs for our Inos.

D-day awaited us in the morning, the first meeting with our adopted daughter Inose... Immediately after breakfast, we waited impatiently at the hotel reception. The taxi arrived on time exactly for the appointed time, where the porter opened the door of the car, from which she ran to the rope, and ran straight to her husband and hugged him with tears in her eyes... It took a while for both of them to realize that I was also standing there, wait-



ing! After a while, when we all came to our senses, we got into a taxi together and moved to the centre of Mombasa, to the school, where we had an arranged tour and a meeting with the principal. After a tour of the school and the premises of the boarding school, we sat briefly in the principal's office, where she shared with us her opinion of Inose's personality, evaluated her academic results and her potential for further professional growth (we were guite proud when we learned that our lnose is among the ten best students of the year) After lunch, the principal and I said goodbye, on the way we also visited the house where Inose lives with her brothers, who were waiting for us there. We sat at their house for a while, had tea together and went on the final stage to our resort on Diani beach, where we spent a few days together in a very friendly atmosphere. Then we made Inosa's big dream come true, who wanted us to invite her brothers to dinner and eat together in the evening as one big family. It was a pleasant meet-

ing, we laughed a lot and we all felt very comfortable. Finally, our last day together came... It wasn't easy, but in the end, we managed it quite well.

Epilogue: Since our meeting in Kenya, we have practically been in daily contact. Sometimes Inose would just say good morning or good night to us via WhatsApp, or she would call to share her experiences or moods, at other times for some advice... Sometimes it is difficult, but the feeling that someone far away is thinking of you and unconsciously needs you, she is grateful that she has someone with whom she can consult or just talk to, that she has someone who is interested in her fate, it's definitely worth-

## Island of Hope became my newhome

## **Tabitha's story**

My name is Tabitha Wanjiru. I come from a family that has three members, my mom, my sister and me. Only my mother raised me because my father died in 2004. It was not easy for my mother, because she did not have a permanent job and depended only on casual work, so not always she was able to put bread in front of us. And also pay our school fees. When we ran out of money, we had to

to stay at home with my sister and forget about going to school. But I found out that it is in Kasarani a school that provides free uniforms, textbooks, food and quality education. It was fun to get back to school activities and after a short time I also had the privilege of getting a sponsor.

Then I was supposed to advance to the 6th grade, but our school no longer provided the second level of education. Suddenly we couldn't afford to go to school again. My mother went to work on the farms and my sister and I also tried to help as much as we could so that we would have something to eat. But our life was still very rough, so we were forced to move in with my mother's aunt.

A bright star shone in our hearts when the meeting took place in the humanist office. But only I had anadoptive parent, not my sister. So I had to deal with not seeing my sister. He and his mother went back to their grandmother and I stayed with my aunt. I went to school, but it was difficult because my aunt's harshness was endless. I felt a lot of frustration because my sister became a street girl who lives by what she finds in the garbage, collectsplastic and sells it to earn living.

The situation became unbearable for me. I looked for my sister and together we met with Dana and Ken and I explained everything to them. They felt very sorry for me and my sister.


Therefore, our journey to Rusinga beganat the beginning of 2010. My joy was accompanied by the knowledge that I was going to a completely different environment, that I would start a new life there, meet new friends and be far from the cruel Nairobi. The only thing that made the situation a little more difficult was that we came from a different tribe. We are Kikuyu and met people from the Luo tribe for the first time in our lives.

To my astonishment, I discovered that corporal punishmentis not allowed in the humanistic "Island of Hope" because they

treat people the way they want to betreated. Thanks to the good environment and also the wise teachers, my school performance improved and I was among the top five students after every exam. After finishing elementary school, I was called to one of the best secondary schools.

Four years later, I finished high school and passed the national exam. I got a C grade. That's why I was looking for a high ervocational school and there I signed up for the Business Organization and Information

Technology course. I studied the course for two years and successfully completed it.



And then the big day came when I flew home and was reliving all the joy of being on Rusing and eatingfish and swimming in Lake Victoria and seeing my family and siblings. After arriving at the airport, I was greeted by my mother, whom I was so happy to see. She was doing well now, thanks to the financial support I sent her from a broad. And then I immediately had to go to Rusing, to my home. I met my "daddy and mommy", Mr. and Mrs. Joash, at which I will never forget.

I am very grateful to Dana and Ken, as well as to the entire Center Narovinu, and I am most grateful to Ms. Vařeková Ludmila. May Godbless her!
