Hello Ms. Motejzíkóvá,

At the end of June, you sent out letters from Kenya to the adoptive parents. As always, you also included bulletin. I became interested in article written by you, Ms. Cumpelikova and Ms. Feminova. I had exactly the same problems. Based on my questions raised to Narovinu Center, the coordinator in Kenya takes photos of my supported child with every package that I send. It means that I have now perfect overview that my child received everything. But I was not getting answers to the questions I wrote in my letters. This is why I tested the recommended approach – I wrote my questions on a special sheet of paper and I was interested in seeing if it comes back filled in....

And I am happy to say that my extra sheet of paper with questions came back filled in. It really works. After 2 years of adoption, the child also raises questions and I answer them. Our correspondence became more personal and warmer and it is not so formal any more. Maybe you can recommend it also to other parents who still did not get answers to their questions.

• one child (6 years old), single mother – not married • originally from Homa Bay County • likes watching movies, listening to music




I'm Michael Ogueno Mangana, usually known as Jack Mangana. I'm 38 years old now, married, with two children.

My name is Pamela Achteng Oheno, I am 43 years old and I have 4 children, two of them are in the program of distance adoptions. I also have 2 grandchildren, who attend our primary school. I originally come from Rusinga Island. I have been working here since 2004. I started as a cleaning lady and I was also helping in the orphanage. Currently, I am working as a head of kitchen department and I am responsible for the

food store and food preparation for all the children in the Island of Hope, it means cca 500 children. I enjoy especially the orphanage children because I feel like their mother as they do not have own parents. I am really thankful to be a part of this project. Hobbies – cooking, sharing stories with kids, singing.



My name is Ronaldo B. Gitana, I am 52 years old, married and having 2 sons. I read books during my leisure time – Bible, fishing or science fiction books. I like to ride bike during my free time too. I am interested in organic farming. I am responsible for fish breeding project and for farm at Ostrov Naděje. I studied fishing on one of the most known fishing schools in Philippines, Bicol Fishing University. I finished my studies in 1986 and from that time I do fishing. I was

working in several countries, particularly in India, Mosambik, Vietnam, Zambia, Zimbabwe and Malaysia.

The fish breeding project was launched last year on 26th January. We repaired and improved existing 4sqm fish cages and we produced 6 new 36sqm ones. We upgraded two pounds which were originally used for fish reproduction from hatchery. After 9 months of hard work we started to catch small cages and we saw fruits of our work. In January 2019, we finished the catching of 4th cage. And slowly but surely we grow local market for our brand „Fish for All“ – fresh and quality fishes from lake with excellent taste.

Health insurance and an example of an interesting extra payment



Extra payments are one-time payments that are sent only exceptionally, up to three times a year (once a trimester). Adoptive parents send them to their children parallel with school fees. Most often, money is used to buy food and clothing for families in difficult life situations, to purchase a notebook for college students, a bicycle for children who have to take a time-consuming trip to school on foot. Extra payments are mainly used to support children in their studies, so we always verify their needs. However, there are also less usual payments.

This interesting example of extra payment is very much related to our health insurance program. If Melsa (ID 52391) did not have health insurance, she would not know about her recurrent illness. Thanks to the program, the girl goes for regular checks and examinations. That is how doctors found out that Melsa had typhoid three times in six months. Quick-witted and conscious adoptive mother offered to help and use the extra payment for the vaccination against the typhoid. Hopefully, the girl will avoid this illness and will be smiling again.

Years of experience have shown us that children often have to interrupt their school attendance due to accidents and com-

mon illnesses. The costs of health care are high in Kenya, families do not have the resources to visit a doctor, so the children do not get quality treatment. In 2009, we launched the Health Insurance Project, which covers the costs of treatment and health care for children. At the same time, the project provides information on the most common diseases and their prevention. Insurance provide children with:

- complete screening, including blood tests for HIV (provided that the tests will be approved by the family);
- HIV-positive patient monitoring, medicines and all necessary information;
- information on prevention of common illnesses;
- reimbursement of treatment costs and medication in case of hospitalization, ie. including medical care for more severe conditions requiring hospitalization, including accidents;
- reimbursement of treatment costs and medication for outpatient treatment.

If you are considering insurance, you can always insure your child for the period from June 1 to May of the following year by sending an amount of CZK 1,500 (EUR 60) to our account by May 15. As a variable symbol, enter the number 6 + number of your "child", under which it is registered in the database of "adopted children" (ie, eg 641023).

One of those children you can support within the project of Long-distance Adoption of African Children -is **WILLIAM**. We would like to share his story with you. William AwinoOmbalo (ID 52672) has three siblings and is the youngest of the family. Their parents died, so their aunt, housewife and widow with her own children takes care of them. She has to feed and pay tuition fees for all of them. Monthly they have about 1800 KES

(approx. 418 CZK). The family therefore completely depends on the gifts from the benefactors and relatives. They live in their own clay house with two rooms. They cook on a fire and use water from the lake. William likes to play football and volleyball. In school, he enjoys Swahili, mathematics, physics, chemistry and history. William would once like to become a lawyer. In 2019 he joined the 3rd year of the High School of Hope-Humanist Mixed Boarding Sec. School. In the previous years, his aunt tried to pay school fees herself, but she was not able to. That is why we decided to include William into the adoption program so he did not have to leave school because of an unpaid tuition fee. The boy needs support in the amount of 5600 CZK / 220 EUR per trimester. He has two years to complete his secondary education. Visit of Francis in Kilingili



It's Christmas time, 2017. I'm reading the Lonely Planet guide and making plans for the summer holiday in Kenya, the safari, the sea and suddenly, I realised that Francis, a 17 year-old secondary school student sponsored by my parents for more than ten years, lives in Kenya. We are going to see him. Courageous? Impossible? Risky? I don't hesitate to act and I send an email to Centrum Narovinu and share my idea with them.



It's August 8th, 2018 and we have a half-day trip to Kilingili ahead of us. Rachel, a Nairobi Centrum Deputy, accompanies me and my friend John. The car bounces over a broken road and together with the full suitcase of presents for Francis and his family – long-life food, clothes, sweets, photographs and also a book about Prague. The risky driving of our driver doesn't allow me to close my eyes, so I try to imagine the meeting, what we'll be talking about and how the Francis family will react to us. I'm also trying to mentally prepare for the very poor dwelling of the whole family to avoid being moved and saddened during the visit.

These plans disappear in the first second, Kenyan spontaneity overwhelms them. The meeting begins and will be joyful and emotional and unforgettable.

We say hello to Francis, his father and his brother and then to his grandmother and many other relatives living in hous-

es nearby. Everyone is ready to join and help bring food and other gifts out of the car. Most children come when Francis decides to share the sweets that we have brought from the Czech Republic.

Francis' basic school teacher takes the role of a guide. She shows us a clay cottage about 10m², one half serving as a kitchen, the other one is for sleeping, but neither equipment nor furniture. It reminds us of a complicated life situation for Francis. His mother left the family when the three boys were still young, his father was in prison for several years, one of the brothers fled six years ago and no one knows where he is roaming. Daddy was already released from the prison, but unfortunately he drinks alcohol and cannot support the family. The teacher holds a protective hand over Francis and takes care to allow him to continue studying. He does not give up in hard times.

The sad voice soon passes into the driving telling about the school, where Francis is best of all in mathematics and religion, and he would like to become an engineer. We talk, we hug, we shoot photos and videos, we absorb strong moments, and we can see how gifts are brought to our feet. The Francis family is so poor that they don't own field or cattle but pride and sense of justice will not allow them to leave us with empty hands. So, we get three huge, approximately fifty-kilo heavy clusters of bananas, freshly chopped sugar cane, and when they begin to hunt a chicken on grandmother's courtyard, we know that we wouldn't be allowed to go to the hotel with it.

We slowly say goodbye, and on the way home we discuss the meaning of all of this. Maybe the father and uncles confiscate food and exchange it for alcohol, which they obviously consume in a large amount. Maybe Francis, just like his father, will one day steal food to get rid of hunger and start a life of crime. Perhaps the teacher will be a strong enough example to study and fulfil his dream of becoming an engineer. Perhaps he will become a good example for his siblings and he will also help them to achieve higher things. It makes sense to hope. It makes sense to believe. It makes sense.

Project „Kenya“ at Kojetín grammar school



The grammar school at Kojetín is involved in the project „Světová škola“ („World School“ is czech educational project for schools) already 2 years. It practically means that we choose one topic each each, create a team of students – volunteers and we work with this subject during the whole year including real help within the topic.

Cambodia was our subject during first year of the project. One of our students comes from this country and that is why we chose it. We worked about Ukraine last year as we have students from this state in our school too. We chose a country without any link to our students for school year 2018/2019, nevertheless we hope that this year topic will be similarly successful as previous ones.



Our this year subject is Kenya, as you have already got to know at the title of this article. We were searching for a partner with whom we could realize the project and that is how we found Centrum

Narovinu organisation, which has an office in Kenya and which works with local communities overthere.

We appreciated a professional approach of Mrs. Simona Heřtusová. She offered us several options how to be involved and support directly in Kenya. As we are a school institution, we chose a support of community centrum Ostrov naděje with kindergarten, basic and high school.

There is visible a lot of work behind us even only the first semester is gone. From October, students make a short presentation with Kenya topics for students from lower classes of our grammar school. The presentations covered topics about geography, nature, history and art. Literature, daily life in slums and physical education subjects are coming next. The plan is to play some Kenya game too. We are going to share interesting information about famous Kenya athletes.

Before Christmass, septima students prepared a theatre piece called Kenya is not pink. They rewrote and versified Sleeping Beauty fairytale using Kenya farm as a background. The theatre play was successful – viewers liked many funny moments and music parts.

We organized a presentation of the whole project during the day of open doors of our grammar school. One class room changed literally to exhibition room and activities of Centrum Narovinu organisation (foundation and support of community center Ostrov Naděje in Kenya) were presented on big format photographs. Fair trade shop products were offered during the exhibition. The interest was quite big, the most in fair trade tea and coffee. Around 200 visitors came to see school during the day of open doors and nearly all of them visited the exhibition for a while at least.



What we are preparing for the second semester?

We will produce simple school tools for students of Kenya high school. We are going to share with them following topics: school life habits, how we use leisure time, what we like in our countries and which are our traditions.

Photographs of Ostrov Naděje in will be exposed in Information center Kojetín, from 5th February till 8th March. Visitors will have chance to see pictures of national parks, towns, to meet Kenya history, art and daily life of ordinary people. In March, the exhibition will be moved to shopping mall Galerie in Přerov. The collection of school needs for students in Ostrov naděje in Kenya will be organized together with the exhibition.

We also collect cans in order to get some money from their selling – for buying books for students at Ostrov Naděje. We hope that we collect a lot, as many people is involved – not only from Kojetín, but also from Kroměříž, Prostějov, Chropyně, Němčice nad Hanou and from further villages in neighbourhood.
